ADVOCACY

As you know, public advocacy is a critical part of Heritage Winnipeg's mandate. The following buildings are the recent heritage issues we have been working on.

DENNISTOUN HOUSE

-166 Roslyn Heritage Winnipeg was present on June 24th



when the proposed demolition of this heritage building (for a highrise condominium development) went to City Council. Despite effective speeches by members of the heritage community and impassioned protests by Councillors Gerbasi, Thomas and Orlikow, the demolition of this architecturally and historically significant home was confirmed by a vote of 9-6 to make way for a new condominium development.

GRAIN EXCHANGE ANNEX

-153 Lombard St.

On July 13th Heritage Winnipeg was in attendance at the Property and Development Committee meeting regarding the possible demolition of the Annex to make way for a proposed parkade. Although the building will be destroyed, a comprimise was secured insofar as the facade of the new parkade will incorporate the historical character of the surrounding streetscape.

RYAN BUILDING

-104 King St. The demolition of the Ryan Building was recently completed this summer. Deconstruction



began in early June due to its hazardous condition, largely caused by neglect. A parking structure will be built on the site and developers plan to use the original bricks in the reconstruction of the facade of the Ryan Building at King and Bannatyne. No rendering has been approved for the design of the new portion of the parkade.
